wo weeks ago, Dana and I were discussing that I have now served Riverside as your Senior Pastor for two years. We have been blessed to be a part of God's movement in this fellowship and look forward to continuing to discern and act upon God's will with you.

We have experienced significant blessings from God this year and I am reminded of Jesus' words in Mark 4:26-29, ". . . The Kingdom of God is like a man who casts seed upon the ground; and goes to bed at night and gets up by day, and the seed sprouts up and grows – how, he himself does not know. The earth

produces crops by itself; first the blade, then the head, and then the mature grain in the head. But when the crop permits, he immediately puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come."

This passage reminds us that the fruitfulness of Riverside is God's work. Our task is to plant seeds and tend to the soil, but God does the growing. We are merely participants in His story and ready to move and act on his prompting.

As I look back upon 2009, we were able to do this in several ways.

God has greatly blessed our Discovery Hour at 9am. When we began the Discovery Hour in 2008, we hoped that it would be an opportunity for both adults and children to discover God more deeply through scripture and community. This happened repeatedly throughout 2009 and we reached new peaks in involvement at the end of the year and now into 2010. Not only did our children engage the Bible in relevant ways, but throughout the year we were able to have theologically rich discussions in the various adult Discovery Hour classes we offered, such as Colos-

While our focus remains on growing deeper and deeper walks for Christ, it was great to see more and more students committing their free time to hanging out and talking about Jesus with us. We started the year with a Super Bowl party followed by an invitation to see commun-

ion in a new way-we brought out some bagels, buttered and jellied them up, popped straws into some grape juice boxes, and had the students serve each other the elements. It was awesome to start the year looking at our faith through new lenses. We found that after our first semester with the students that we needed to get creative to keep their attention in the sensory overload age of tech-

nology-aka cell phones! Our first in-depth study was called The Gospel Journey Maui where we discussed the mainstream religions of the world through a reality series made for high school students. We found that it was a great tool to get them interested in why they believe in Jesus-not just because it's what their par-

sians, Philippians, Christian Foundations, Creeds and Confessions, Evangelical Covenant Church Affirmations, Parenting, and What Is Church?

God also opened up avenues for us to more actively engage our community and the world through compassion and justice. Most notable in 2009 was our partnership with SOBA (Sick of Being Alone). SOBA is a ministry that cares for "21st Century widows and orphans." The group is composed of single moms that have dealt with abuse, divorce, separation, abandonment and other situations that have left them feeling alone. In 2009 the group met every week at Riverside with various speakers that sought to provide a safe place for Christ-centered grief, hope and restoration. Riverside regularly provides childcare, meals and other help for the group. We also hosted a forum entitled, "How To Support Victims and Survivors of Domestic Abuse" and provide space for a Child Therapist to meet with children of SOBA participants weekly. In 2010, we hope to continue to live life with the women of SOBA, connect them with needed support, and help them to experience the transformative power of Jesus Christ.

Riverside also responded to two opportunities to share our resources this past Christmas. We continued our annual tradition of providing basic supplies for children throughout the world by packing shoeboxes through Operation Christmas Child. In addition, we hosted a Jubilee Christmas event which partnered Riverside families with other Tippecanoe County families that did not have the resources to purchase Christmas gifts for their families. Riverside shared 77 new toys and over \$2,000 with local families. Each family received new toys for their children, Kroger food certificates, and a

ham to prepare for their Christmas meal. Riverside hosted the families and

spent several hours with them sharing punch and cookies and wrapping gifts.

There are countless other things that I would love to elaborate on but for the sake of space I will simply list them. Riverside utilized several thousand dollars to meet the needs of our congregation and the local community through our benevolence fund. This money purchased bus tokens, paid for delinquent gas bills, filled gas tanks, and a lot more. Riverside provided a care package of basic necessities for every family in Elim, Alaska for Easter. Each week two different groups of children with disabilities came from area schools and used the Riverside facility to work on life skills such as cleaning. Every Wednesday West Lafayette Young Life leaders fed a grilled cheese lunch to West Lafayette High School students at Riverside. The Riverside Waterline newsletter is now sent out via email each week with links to stories on our website. Riverside hosted two blood drives and donated several gallons of blood to local blood banks. I was ordained by the Evangelical Covenant Church in Portland, Oregon in June. Riverside had a wonderful afternoon of fellowship during our Riverside Family Picnic in July. Riverside partied with our neighbors in August

during our 2nd Annual Riverside Block Party. Several Riverside families attended an Indianapolis Indians base-

ball game. Riverside purchased the white house adjacent to our property to accommodate our numerical growth in September. Riverside held three Christmas services, including a Blue Christmas service for people who had suffered loss or hardship in 2009 and two Christmas Eve services.

In 2009, Rhonda Ausk stepped down as the Riverside Women's Ministry Director. Rhonda had been leading this ministry since 2003 and played a pivotal role in its growth and success. She continues to be active in the ministry and I am thankful for her time and gifts.

Riverside welcomed 30 new members in 2009. I conducted six weddings: Tanner and Rachel (Bowen) Georgiades, Sterling and Sabrina (Lane) Matheson, Adrian and Kirsten (Allen) Weidenfeller, Brett and Jaime (Rose) Johnson, Josh and Rachael (Henson) Kraft, and Brandon and Katie (Koshon) Schmidt. Dave Timmerman performed two additional weddings at Riverside: William and Melissa (Kraus) Lindsey and Jay and Cyndi (Kershner) Morgan. I also led funeral services to celebrate the lives of Bill Jackson and Gordon Brand.

We began 2009 with an overall average attendance of 161 and ended the year averaging 187. We peaked on Easter with 262 in attendance. Our 2009 giving was slightly below our expenses, but this was primarily due to the acquisition of the house, which was unanticipated when the 2009 budget was approved.

God has been fruitful amongst us in 2009. As we enter 2010, we must seek to be a community that is always open to change and willing to go anywhere that God leads. God does the growing and we want to partner with Him as it happens.

May 2010 be full of deep spiritual growth for new and old Christians. May we experience God's Word more regularly and clearly through the E100 Bible Reading Plan. May we encounter God's presence more profoundly through the intentional exploration of prayer. May we encounter God's abundance more fully through intimate connections within our multigenerational fellowship. May we truly be God's people doing God's work in our community and the world.

Children's Ministry

he goal of Promiseland is to develop children into fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ. This means our kids grow up to love God, are actively serving His purposes, and are in the process of growing to honor God in all areas of their lives. Promiseland is designed around an outline called the Five Gs. The Five Gs are Grace, Growth, Group, Gifts, and Good Stewardship. These basic principles have been altered to become kid-sized and to be used throughout Promiseland.

GRACE: We want kids to accept the gift of grace (salvation) and extend grace to others (evangelism).

GROWTH: We want kids to grow in knowledge of God and His purposes, grow in understand of how God's purposes include a plan for each of them, and grow in character - being transformed from the inside out by the power of Christ.

GROUP: We want kids to experience friendship in community where they can know and be known, love and be loved, serve and be served, celebrate and be celebrated.

GIFTS: We want kids to explore how God has created them and how they can serve others with the talents they have.

GOOD STEWARDSHIP: We want kids to develop hearts that recognize all they have belongs to God and desire to use their resources and time for His purposes.

We have continued with our two hours of learning time in Promiseland on Sunday morning. Discovery Hour, 9:00-10:00am, is our in-depth Bible study. Children's Church, 10:15-11:15am, is less intense in teaching and more artistic in nature. We have added a Hallway Worship time at the beginning of Children's Church as it became necessary to free up room in the

sanctuary for adult worship. Parents are strongly encouraged to bring their children to Discovery Hour since that is where we spend most of our resources in teaching their children how to become followers of Christ.

In 2009, a top priority was to create a Promiseland Ministry Team to work with me throughout the year. I now have four people on the team and what a blessing they have been as we put our hearts and minds together monthly to make future plans.

Promiseland participated in "big people worship" on Palm Sunday and Christmas Eve. We also presented the Backwards Christmas Pageant in December along with neighborhood caroling and a meal shared together. A teacher and helper appreciation picnic at Happy Hollow

Park was enjoyed in the summer months.

In the fall of 2009, with the purchase of the white house to accommodate the junior/senior high, Promiseland was able to expand into a muchneeded 3-to-5-year-old room for Children's Church.

We currently have 51 teachers and helpers and 70 3-yearolds through 5th-graders in Promiseland. This is nearly a 100% increase from last year.

I continue to praise God for His faithfulness and give Him all the glory and honor.

uring 2009 we were able to start two new groups. The first was begun at the initiative of Philip and Monica Cardella and now includes four couples. This second group was begun on the basis of work that Tom and Debby Smiley, John Christopher, and Dave Timmerman did in contacting approximately twentyfive RCC individuals or families who were then involved in a small group. Dan Teefey and Dave constructed the list, and then each was contacted. We may be able to start a group in January as well with individuals who expressed interest but indicated they were too busy. We held small group leaders meetings periodically through the year for coordination, support, and ongoing training. We also tried hard to find a conference for our leaders to attend for continuing education but despite our best efforts we were unable to find one that we felt would work well for us.

Given the positive growth in our Men's Bible studies and the continued strength of our Women's ministry we feel good about the level of involvement in our small group ministry. We currently have 7 small groups meeting.

Plans for 2010 Our goals for the coming year are quite similar to those we had for 2010. We would like to continue to attempt to expand the number of small groups and to provide support for those currently operating. This will include networking activities by the three of us as well as regular meetings for leaders. We would hope to find a one-day seminar within traveling distance and imagine that the registration cost might reasonably be expected to be between \$75 and \$100. We imagine taking 10-12 of our current leaders which number 14 or so. We will also look for alternative ways for continuing education for our leaders such as bringing a guest to lead a workshop at We are excited Riverside. about the Small Group ministry at Riverside and the opportunity to develop it further.

ents believe, but desiring them to step into their faith on their own. We also led the 30-Hour Famine and invited the youth group from Battle Ground UMC to join us. We learned about human trafficking, what people around the world eat from day to day, and how as children of God we should want to respond. We gathered food around the neighborhood and went on a very impactful prayer walk around Purdue where so many homeless people get food and money.

Discovery Hour grew leaps and bounds during the spring season which was super exciting. We went from usually having 2 or 3 students on Sunday mornings to having 10-12! We studied The Journey series from the Covenant denomination series for students. In one year we walked through Old Testament and learned from the stories we heard over and over as children how to live our lives today-knowing that God is so good and desires us to be in relationship with Him forever no matter what. We were able to lead a service towards the end of the school year that was the culmination of all we had been studying about how amazing our Lord is with Cardboard Testimonies. We invited others who felt led to share a part of their story to write their testimony and we shared them for all to seemostly through tears-the ridiculous ways that God has loved us through circumstances and choices in our lives.

We spent a month raising funds for our summer mission trips and giving the congregation the chance to play along as we loaded their yards with bright pink flamingos. It was awesome to see the church pour out their love on us and our mission to serve communities in Alabama and Minnesota. We prepared the students for the best and hardest week of their lives. They served both an African-American community and a Native-American community through praver, painting, trash pick-up, childcare, and serving meals. I hope that the lessons learned on those two trips will never leave our stu-

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hands and feet of Christ. We also had the chance to slow the pace of life this summer with the students. 
to move there this summer. In November Riverside provided over 70 gift-filled shoeboxes to Samaritan Purse's Operation Christmas Child.




