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n my report last year, I ended by sharing three goals for 2010: to "experience God's Word more regularly and clearly," to "encounter God's presence more profoundly through the intentional exploration of prayer," and to "encounter God's abundance more fully through intimate connections within our multi-generational fellowship."

I believe God enabled us to meet these goals in 2010.

We began 2010 by spending six months reading and studying God's Word together

through the E100 Bible Reading Plan. Each day we read a Bible passage accompanied by a devotion written by many of you. Then our Discovery Hour class, Men's and Women's Bible studies, and sermons all covered these texts in more detail. Our stated goals were to develop a daily habit of reading God's Word and to get a broad picture of the story of God from Genesis to Revelation. I was encouraged to hear how this was a powerful time for many of you. I heard, "The E100 was used by God to change my entire life." Someone else said, "Not coming from a church that

had us read the Bible, this was the first time I opened it 100 days in a row. It was fantastic! I am growing in my faith walk all the time and love the road I'm on." Another family said, "What a wonderful and inspiring experience!"

In 2010, we also endeavored to move from a church that believes that prayer is important to a church that lives as if prayer is vital. Our leadership, congregation and ministries are now bathed in prayer through various prayer teams. In addition, prayer leaders

s I reflect back on my transition I simply cannot imagine a more positive and supportive scenario. The staff, Leadership Team, musicians, technicians, ushers, greeters and Riverside church family as a whole have been a joy to work with. I have now served as the worship pastor for roughly one year and I remain deeply grateful for the opportunity to use my gifts. God has continued to richly bless

the music and worship ministry at Riverside and I am grateful to partner in what God is doing in our church. It has truly been a blessing to create new friendships and become involved in the network that drives our Sunday services and Riverside programs. A great deal of time goes into learning how to work with new people. As a result much of this past year has been about the gradual and subtle process of my

learning to work with our volunteers and vice versa. In addition, Dan and I met on a regular basis to talk and pray our way through ideas, dreams, and possible improvements regarding Sundays and the worship ministry. Our conversations frequently came back to our common desire for people to know and love the Word of God, and in doing so be

have risen up and begun to spread their passion for prayer to others. These leaders are drawing all of us into more vibrant conversations with God. Much of Riverside's progress with prayer is outlined in the Prayer Movement's report. Perhaps even more important than organized prayer teams and opportunities to pray is the increase in spontaneous prayer that has been happening in our congregation. I have witnessed many occasions when events and conversations have been halted for a time of prayer. Both staff and Leadership Team meetings have been paused to lay hands on someone and to ask for God's healing, wisdom and guidance. Men have spontaneously stayed after the Men's Bible study to pray for others. Women gathering for evenings of fun have found themselves in deep prayer around the struggles and joys of their lives. These powerful moments were not happening with frequency in the past. I hope that we can continue to kindle these divine sparks in 2011.

One of Riverside's greatest strengths is the connectedness of our multi-generational congregation. And one of our goals for 2010 was to continue to cultivate and deepen these relationships with one another. Although the transition to two Sunday morning worship services has affected our "small" church feel, we

have continued to succeed in providing opportunities for fellowship and deeper relationships through casual conversations in our Welcome Center on Sundays, our annual Riverside Picnic, fellowship meals, Discovery Hour, Men's and Women's Ministries and Small Groups.

Our facilities discussions also provided an unexpected context for us to grow in our relational strength this year. I believe that the maturity and depth of relationships is often determined by how disagreement is weathered. Although our property discussions often led to divergent viewpoints, Riverside remained united around our common worship of Jesus Christ. Our process was not perfect and some relationships were strained, but by God's grace we emerged stronger for having faithfully wrestled with God, each other and our various facility options.

Two powerful Riverside memories stick in my mind from 2010. Early this past year a Trinity Mission resident became a part of our congregation and dedicated his life to Jesus Christ through our Discovery Hour. He has since been sentenced to prison for crimes he committed before becoming a part of Riverside. Despite his incarceration, he is visited every week by a Riverside member and receives several letters a week from others within our congregation. Recently when I visited

him in jail he said, "Everyone was nice to me and everything when I was with Riverside on Sundays, but to be honest, I had no idea Riverside would stay in touch with me while I was in jail. It really keeps my faith going."

I am also reminded of the powerful Sunday afternoon we spent on the bank of the Wabash River baptizing many from our congregation. Not only was it a powerful time for those there, but the picture slideshow of the day posted on our website has touched countless others. One person commented on our website, "I just experienced a few heart swelling moments watching this video. Haven't felt so uplifted and inspired in a long time. Thanks for enriching my day."

There are countless other Riverside stories of God's amazing work that I could share but for the sake of space I will simply list some other memories. Riverside again utilized several thousand dollars to meet the needs of our congregation and the local community through our benevolence fund. Riverside donated several gallons of blood to the local blood bank through our blood drives. Riverside transitioned to two Sunday worship services. Riverside held its first Vacation Bible School. Riverside offices were moved from our main facility to the adjacent white house. Riverside's Drama Ministry performed a powerful version of "Everything" by Lifehouse. Riverside purchased a parcel of vacant land. Riverside held three Christmas services, including a Blue Christmas service for people who had suffered loss or hardship in 2010, and two Christmas Eve ser-

In 2010, Riverside said goodbye to Dave and Polly Timmerman. Dave served Riverside for nearly ten years as a staff member and leader. His leadership was essential throughout his time with Riverside.

In 2010, Riverside hired a new Worship Director. For several years, Matt Muehlhausen had graciously volunteered as our Worship Director, but in the early part of the year Riverside hired Todd Burkholder for the position. Todd brings many gifts to our staff and congregation.

Riverside welcomed 26 new members in 2010. I conducted three weddings: Rick and Wendy Mouser, David and Callie Vershum, and David and Lisa Eislele. I also renewed the wedding vows of Gary and Maggie Rogiers. In addition, I led funeral services to celebrate the lives of Bill Pape and Joyce Christopher.

In 2010 our average Sunday attendance was 210. We peaked on Easter with 342 in attendance. Our 2010 giving

romiseland Children's Ministry is about teaching children to know, love, and live for Jesus. We measure this process by their personal commitments to Christ, memorization of scripture, giving to missions, and a spiritual evaluation by the Riverside Youth Director when they enter into the Junior/Senior High Youth Ministry.

 - Began two teaching times and Hallway Worship during the two worship services, us-

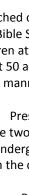
ing the same curriculum each time but with different teachers.

We currently have 32 teachers and 81 children (two-yearolds through 5th grade) participating in Promiseland. God is good and we praise Him for his continued faithfulness to our children's ministry.

Our Walker Nursery also continues to grow. After pulling the two-year-olds out of the nursery for their own Promiseland class, our numbers are averaging five toddlers. More recently, our numbers have jumped back up to

eight children during the second worship hour. Last fall we began a short interactive lesson with these children during both services, which has been very successful. In fact, when we offer childcare for special services, our toddlers demand the lesson as well!

We have successfully moved our infants into what used to be our church office. This places our nurseries across

the hall from each other and at the bottom of our steps for the convenience of our parents. We have a large room for happy playing and crawling, as well as a separate room for sleeping infants or nursing mothers. Although we have low numbers currently in the youngest nursery, we keep it staffed with two volunteers

We did lots of activities that we've done in the past, the 30-Hour Famine, Youth Service, sleepovers, Bible study at Greyhouse, a float We felt very convicted that as a group of believers we needed to put our faith into action whenever possible.



This led us to do an "at home" mission trip this summer where we helped Ellen Delisle get her new home up to par before she and her kids moved in. We painted every room and completely land-scaped

popsicles but the crazy vehicle we were driving—the Jesus Jalopy!

We also stretched the students spiritually and physically on our trip to Wilderness Trail. We hiked 45 miles in four days with 30 pound backpacks. It poured down rain on us two nights in a row on top of it! But it was BEAUTIFUL and we got to experience what it means to fully rely on the Lord for everything.

As the church moved to two services, we had a huge surge in attendance for Discovery Hour. In 2011 we will use this time to do a Bible study that builds on itself, which has been difficult to pull off in the past (because not everyone comes to everything). We believe that using Sunday morning to stretch the students in their faith will produce more of the results that the believers in Acts experi-

enced—lives changed, students choosing to live counterculturally, and healing from their hurts. That is our main goal for 2011—to be a different kind of youth group that is in the Word and then goes out to change their world with what is overflowing from their hearts. It's a tall order, but one we know will please the Lord. We'll focus less on programming and entertaining them, and more on how we can be used by the Lord. We won't underestimate what they can do just because they're young, but be inspired by them!!

Men's Ministry

he Riverside Men's
Ministry moves into
2011 seeking to maintain recent momentum. The
Men's Ministry finished 2010
with its largest Men's Breakfast in memory. In December,
more than thirty men gathered to feast on a fantastic
breakfast and to hear Matt
Muehlhausen's testimony. It
was a fantastic morning and a
great time for conversation
and connection.

The meat of the Men's Minis-

try has continued to be its two Men's Bible studies. One study meets on Monday nights at 7 pm and the other study meets on Thursday mornings at 6:30 am. The studies met nearly every week of 2010 and featured lively discussions of God's Word. In 2010 Riverside men studied the E100 Bible Reading Plan, Proverbs and the Gospel of John. The Bible studies will continue to work through the Gospel of John into 2011.

The Men's Ministry began 2010 with a trip to the West Lafayette vs. Jefferson High School boys basketball game. The men had dinner at Bruno's and then enjoyed the game with some guys from Trinity Mission.

The annual Men's Retreat with Evangelical Covenant Church in Lafayette was held in March. More guys from Riverside attended the 2010 retreat than had ever attended before. New friend-

ships were made and the men were challenged to grow deeper in their relationships with God and each other.

The Riverside Men's Ministry held another successful golf outing in July at Harrison Hills Golf Club in Attica. Lots of prizes were awarded and the weather cooperated this year. This continues to be a great opportunity for Riverside men to invite friends to be a part

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Prayer Movement

uring the summer, a Prayer Leadership Team was developed and began monthly meetings. Vision and mission statements were developed to guide God's Prayer Movement at Riverside. Our vision is to be people of prayer. The mission of God's Prayer Movement at Riverside is to motivate and equip Riverside to pray and to provide opportunities for specific prayer as led by the Holy Spirit.

Several prayer teams have been established throughout the year. We have three teams for the Pastor's Prayer Shield (to pray for Dan and his family) and the Congregational Prayer Teams (to pray for the needs of the congregation). Each team prays for one month and then has two months off. Also, we have an

e-mail team who prays for prayer requests when they open them in e-mail.

Significantly, we have people who pray for Riverside as a whole, the worship services, and the various ministries and their leaders during the Sunday services at 9:00 & 10:45. They do so in the Prayer Room in the white house (aka copy room). Likewise, we have people who pray for Dan and Todd and the praise team prior to the first service each Sunday. Furthermore, on the first Sunday of each month, we have an opportunity for the congregation to come up for prayer at the end of each service.

We have also had several special events related to prayer. Two prayer classes were offered and facilitated by several guest teachers. Thirty individuals participated in the two classes. "The Importance of Prayer" was a 10-week class offered during the Discovery Hour in the spring. It was based upon teachings by Dutch Sheets and Adele Ahlberg Calhoun. Then in the fall, Jim Cymbala's "When God's People Pray" six-week video series was offered during both services in the white house. In September, more than 70 people participated in our first prayer walk praying for the surrounding neighborhoods. We hosted a pitch-in meal and followed-up the walk with an ice-cream social. In November, we encouraged people to pray for the persecuted church. Finally, between Thanksgiving and Christmas, we encouraged the congregation to pray for the unsaved (for at least one day)

and supplied a simple postcard as a prayer guide. We were delighted when all 68 postcards were taken.

We are beginning 2011 with a monthly prayer calendar of short daily prayer requests for the activities and individuals that make-up Riverside. In the coming year, we pray God will continue to grow the Prayer Movement at Riverside. We pray that the number of people participating on the various prayer teams will increase, and that Riverside will continue to grow in prayer, taking everything to God in prayer first. We will continue to have special events such as prayer walks, classes, and special times to pray.

Facilities & Grounds

his year we were blessed to have many volunteers working hard to make our buildings safer and more user friendly.

In the church, emergency exits, lights, signs, and smoke detectors were repaired. The kitchen area was finished. The sanctuary was painted

Women's Ministry

Spring came with no ladies' luncheon this year (don't worry, it will be back in 2011) because we hosted our own women's retreat at Camp Tecumseh. We had more than 30 women attend and were able to offer on-site childcare for three nursing babies. Women who attended the retreat enjoyed spa treatments, learning about the book of Ruth, God's beautiful creation, delicious food, crafts and the fellowship of other

women. Fifteen women even dared to ride a zip line and a group went horseback riding as well. It was a very well received event that the Women's Ministry plans to repeat in years to come.

Our summer book clubs had good discussion over the books <u>The Last Sin Eater</u> by Francine Rivers and <u>Castaway Kid</u> by R.B. Mitchell. During the summer, we also offered a Bible study using the book <u>Work in Progress</u> written by Kristen Armstrong.

In the fall, we did Beth Moore's Esther study. This video study was a very intensive but rewarding study. In addition to meeting on Wednesday evenings, a Thursday morning study was offered and it was very well attended (10-14 women weekly). Our women collected enough food with our fall mission project to give six 56-quart storage boxes full of food to four families. Two of



the families' names were given to us through Jubilee Christmas, one was a previous SOBA participant and one was a Bible study attendee's student.

We wrapped up the year with the annual women's Christmas brunch at the home of Dar Muehlhausen. This is a favorite event of many and was attended by 30 women this year. God supplied beautiful snow, loving women and a message of encouragement to warm our hearts and kick off the holiday season.

Overall, the women's ministry had a good year in 2010. We've learned a few things (like no more Bible studies beginning at 6 pm) and started a few new offerings (like a weekly devotion from the encouragement team). Keep your eyes open for all the offerings to come!

Missions

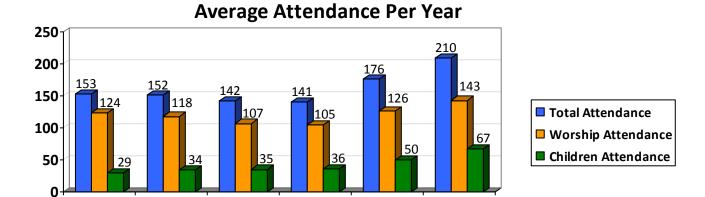

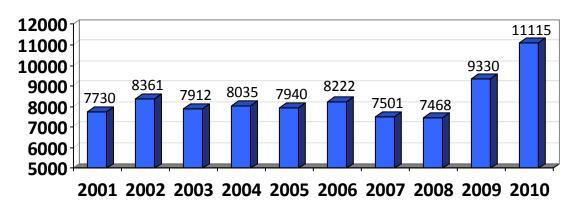
also held a "Blue Christmas" service which provided an opportunity for those grieving or hurting to approach the Christmas season through the lens of longing, patience, and God's promise.

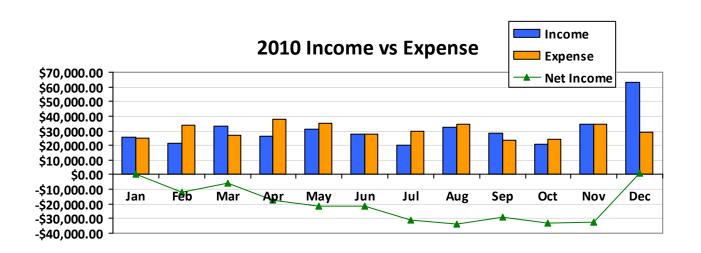
I look forward to what God has next for our church and how He will grow us as a community of worshippers. I continually pray that every heart will be opened to the Spirit and His purpose in our church.

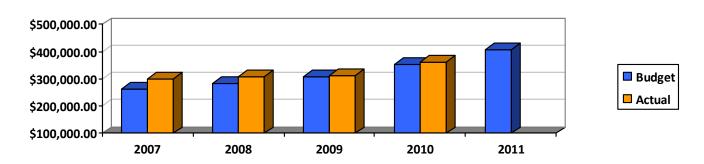


Total Attendance Per Year

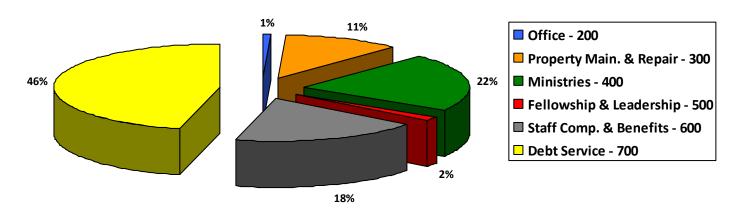




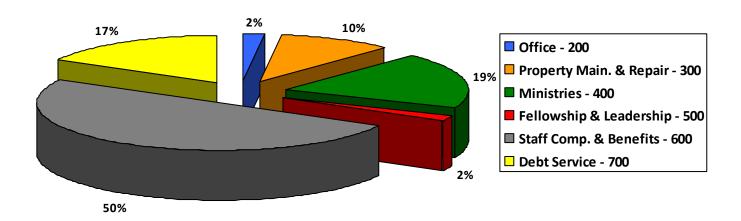
Budget vs Actual Income Per Year
